

The examination of risky sexual behaviors among American college students has become increasingly relevant, as it is essential for promoting healthy practices during the emerging adulthood phase. This study addresses a significant and pertinent topic by exploring the connection between inconsistent condom use and various factors such as a history of drug use, alcohol consumption prior to sexual activities, casual hookups, and one-night stands. What sets this study apart is its novel approach of examining sexual risky behaviors from multiple perspectives, including the relationships between pre-sex drinking, non-injection drug use, hookup experiences, and one-night stands. This unique approach provides a fresh perspective and a solid foundation for the research, making a significant contribution to the existing body of knowledge. Additionally, the paper is well-organized, featuring clear subheadings and a logical flow. Data were collected from 325 sexually active American college students, resulting in a sample size adequate to generate sufficient statistical power and effect size to minimize Type I and Type II errors. A research application was submitted to the Institutional Review Board (IRB) before data collection, and a protocol number was issued following approval. The data analysis and interpretations are thorough and well-supported, even though only Chi-square analysis was employed to assess the associations between condom use practices and risky behaviors. Overall, this paper, with its significant contribution to the existing body of knowledge, underscores the value of the research and warrants publication.
